## LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

I became a Lion to carry on my father's legacy, and I believe in what Lions Clubs International represents. I've seen the work of Lions literally around the world in my travels.

LCI President Dr. Jung-Yul Choi from South Korea is focused on embracing diversity in all its manifestations. While Lions around the world look different, speak different languages, embrace multiple faiths and have different cultures, all Lions have one purpose – to serve.

This club has a long, proud history; in January the club will begin its 104th year of service. To endure that long, this club has had to overcome challenges and reinvent itself periodically. During World War I, the club recycled old tires and sold war bonds. The war ended, and the club took up new activities. specifically. Members like the idea of more social activities outside meetings.

Today, Austin is one of the fastest growing, most desirable places to be on the planet. # GOES OFF WITH A BANG!

ustin Founder Lions hosted the club's ninth annual Sporting Clay Shoot-Out on June 7 at Capital City Clays. A total of 26 teams competed in two fields. Prizes were awarded for First and Second in both the Blue and Red Fields, as well as overall Dead Last. Winning teams were sponsored by Austin Sonic Drive-In and Tokyo Electron America. Second place winners were Lion Greg Harkrider's Edward Jones team and Wiss, Janney, Elsner Associates. Dead Last went to Kimley-Horn. Cameron Labunski and his partner Dante Angelini won the flurry drawing.

The primary beneficiary for the event was the Juvenile Diabetes Research Foundation – Austin Chapter. With LCI's new focus on diabetes, partnering with JDRF enabled the club to help support local activities and resources for children diagnosed with Type 1 diabetes. JDRF – Austin Chapter also helps recruit children with Type 1 diabetes to attend Texas Lions

Camp.

"This year's tournament was the best yet, and we are able to provide JDRF – Austin Chapter with a contribution of \$10,873.00," said Ann Ward event co-chair. JDRF is allowing the club to use these funds to sponsor a Team for the One Walk on Nov. 10 at Toney Burger Center. In addition, the club will be doing vision screening and promoting Texas Lions Camp at the event.

"We held this event in conjunction with our long-time partner, the NFL Alumni – Austin Chapter, and we are pleased to contribute \$4,078.00 to the local organization to use in its work to care for Austin children," she added.

Event, Team and Station Sponsors helped make the tournament a success. In addition, "we also thank the more than 30 volunteers from the JDRF – Austin Chapter, and more than 20 Austin Founder Lions who worked in various capacities from early morning

until mid-afternoon to stage the event. We could not have done it without everyone's support," she added. Some 20 or more NFL Alumni and several members of the University of Texas Trap and Skeet Club volunteered, hosting stations and serving as fill-in shooters.

"We are pleased with the number of community teams and sponsors who are returning year after year. Great Smokey Mo's BBQ, friendly competition and the opportunity to meet former National Football League players make this a fun event, and everyone has a great time," said Michael Cowan, event cochair.

### APD Chief Speaks to Anstin Founder Lions Club

Austin Police Chief Brian Manley spoke to about 50 members and guests of the Austin Founder Lions Club on July 25. The Austin native and 30-year veteran of the force discussed the state of American policing. He reported that the U.S. has about 18,000 police departments that employ some 900,000 men and women. While many of these units employ only 10-15 people, APD has 1,929 officers plus 731 civilians. Each year, APD responds to more than 1 million 9-1-1 calls, as well as initiates some 260,000 contacts, ranging from community meetings to traffic stops.

Manley highlighted some of the differences in policing today and 30 years ago. He attributes the loss of respect for police officers to the creation and explosive growth of social media which allows videos and photographs to be shared instantly. Social media has provided a venue for people to post information that is not verified or is incomplete or out-of-context.

Chief Manley told the Lions that Austin is the fifth safest major city with a population of 500,000 or more; these statistics measure murders, rapes, robberies and aggravated assault. He explained that crime "pockets" itself and is most prevalent in these geographic areas, which tend to have more low-income and people of color. For example, while African Americans represent 8 percent of the city's population, arrests and use of force are much higher in this segment of the population.

Manley explained how individuals are recruited and screened for APD, as well as the eight-month training academy. He proudly stated that women represent 11 percent of the newest class of cadets. During discussion he responded to questions about the city's new ordinance dealing with the homeless population. He also talked about how many of those arrested have mental health issues, and the need for alternatives for individuals with mental health or addiction issues.
