Club Expands Peace Poster Contest

After a successful experience in 2019-2020, Austin Founder Lions Club is expanding its Peace Poster contest to another school this year. One contest will be held among art students ages 11 to 13 at Gus Garcia Young Men's Leadership Academy. Another contest will be held among middle school art students at Bertha Means Young Women's Leadership Academy. "We are pleased to be able to have these two competitions, and look forward to recognizing the artistic talent of these schools' young people," said John Nyfeler, committee chair.

Other committee members for 2020-2021 include AFLC members Gloria Munguia, Syd Popinsky and Ann Ward.

Each school art teacher has been provided with the LCI Peace Poster kit which includes all the rules. By Nov. 15, the club must send the two winning posters to the District for the next level of judging. District winners compete at the Multiple District level, which for AFLC is the state of Texas. The Multiple District winners then compete for the international awards.

Local judges for the posters for both schools have been named and include Nathan Nordstrom, By-permission Grafitti Artist; Yvonne Nava, KVUE anchor; Rex Hamilton, Austin Mural artist; and José Martinez, Mexic-arte Museum.

For the first time since its founding in 1949, Texas Lions Camp did not welcome children to its campus this summer due to COVID-19. However, some 1,100 children with special medication conditions enjoyed a virtual camp, TLC2U. Each of the campers received a box of supplies and camp-branded swag prior to July



4. Austin Founder Lions Club contributed \$1,000 toward the mailing of the special TLC2U boxes, which included a “wish stick.”

Summer camp activities kicked off July 5 with a spectacular live-streamed fireworks show on Facebook. Karen-Anne King, vice president of summer camps, introduced the wish stick concept virtually and encouraged campers to make a “BIG” wish for the upcoming year, and then work to make it come true. 
AFLC Continues Meeting by Zoom; Check Out Recordings


On June 4, to celebrate the passage of the 19th Amendment which gave women the right to vote, the program featured **Mimi Marziani**, president of the Texas Civil Rights Project. The right to vote in the United States has been a bruising political and social struggle over the course of our country's history. Texas faces new challenges with the COVID-19 pandemic. Mimi discussed issues that will determine **how people vote in the November election**; she talked about what citizens can do to ensure the 2020 elections are fair and do not prohibit voters casting their ballot.



On June 11, **Keri K. Stephens**, PhD, an associate professor in Organizational Communication Technology and a Distinguished Teaching Professor in the Moody College of Communication at The University of Texas at Austin, addressed **"COVID-19 and the Future of Work: Five Helpful Tips."** She shared research

and practical tips to help us better understand the challenges faced while working during COVID-19, and provided five tips related to remote work that should be helpful as we re-envision the future of work through our COVID-19 experiences.

The June 18 meeting featured a report on the 2019-2020 year, presentation of awards and the installation of the 2020-2021 board. See related stories in this newsletter.



On June 25, club members heard from another of Membership Chair Mim and Lion Ron Hruby's accomplished granddaughters. **Jacqueline Hruby** spent the spring 2019 semester in Hawke's Bay, New Zealand, working as an **intern for Abundant Robotics** with its Apple Harvesting Robot. She talked about her experiences and what she learned both professionally and personally. Meet another impressive Hruby granddaughter in the recorded program.




On July 2, club members learned about **Women & Their Work**, the Austin nonprofit visual and performing arts organization. For more than 40 years, W&TW has brought groundbreaking art to Austin through exhibitions, performances, and educational workshops. **Betty Trent**, AIA LEEDAP, an architect who has lived in Austin for more than 40 years, spoke in her role as a W&TW board member. She was joined by **Diane Sikes**, program director. At the conclusion of their presentation, they donated a mask for auction to benefit the club's Administrative Fund. It was made from the prayer flags that were

part of the art installation W&TW commissioned, “THIRST,” which featured a 38-foot tall tree killed by drought hovering in the center of Lady Bird Lake to memorialize the 500 million trees that died in Texas as a result of the 2011-2013 droughts. The installation was accompanied by thousands of prayer flags. Artist Beili Liu has repurposed these flags into face masks during the current pandemic.



Members learned important lessons from an 18th Century Eastern European Jewish Rabbi during a July 9 presentation by **Sandy Kress, J.D.**, who had a distinguished career in the political arena where he was a leader in reforming public education. He now turns most of his time, energy and spirit to the study and teaching of sacred texts and other religious topics. He shared “**How Old Hasidic Pearls of Wisdom Can Help Us in Our Own Difficult Time.**”



On July 16, **Maggie Luce** talked about “hybrid agents” in her presentation, “**Real Estate and Lending are Better Together.**” Combining the realtor and loan officer roles ensures buyers get in-depth education and understand their options when buying property.



Dr. David Paydarfar, one of the leading U.S. authorities on the cause, cure and prevention of neurological diseases, spoke to the club on July 23 on “**The Latest Science on Prevention and Cure of Neurological Diseases.**” He provided an update on the proposed development by Dell Medical School of an international center for the cure, treatment and prevention of neurodegenerative diseases such as Alzheimer’s and Parkinson’s diseases, dementia, etc. The recording is available on the YouTube channel.



On July 30, **Dr. Julie Martenson**, executive director, discussed **The University of Texas at Austin Osher Lifelong Learning Institute (UT OLLI)** where curious adults age 50 and older can enjoy classes taught by leading


scholars and experts. Since COVID-19 arrived, OLLI moved online; she previewed plans for the 2020-2021 year.




Wayne Meissner, one of the most notable and recognized criminal defense attorneys and litigators in Texas, spoke on Aug. 6. In his talk “**Law Enforcement and Legal Issues in Austin and Travis County and the 2020 Election,**” he shared his perspective on how the social, racial and discrimination issues occurring nationally are affecting Austin and Travis County and the 2020 election.



Classroom discipline measures disproportionately affect African American students. On Aug. 13, Dr. **Gaye Lang** introduced the club to Restorative Discipline Practices (RDF) in her talk “**Raising the Bar: Measuring Restorative Practices.**”



On Aug. 20, **Qusay Hussein** told his moving story of being a victim of a suicide bomb attack in Mosul, Iraq, which resulted in his loss of eyesight. With the help of Doctors Without Borders, he eventually made his way to Austin where he is an ACC graduate, university student and supporter of Refugee Services of Texas. His program, “**Humanity, Tenacity and Peace,**” is available on YouTube.



Members received an update on “**Texas Lions Camp: Exciting Times Ahead**” on Aug. 27. New TLC Elected Director **Connie Zschoche** and **Ann Ward**, newly elected TLC Board secretary, provided information about the virtual TLC2U camp this summer, upcoming fund-raising events and a major capital campaign effort to replace a quad of bunkhouses.
