## Lions Enjoy In-Person District, State Conventions

A large group of Austin Founder Lions attended the District 2-S3 convention

in Taylor on May 1, and enjoyed the fellowship of an in-person gathering with each other and Lions from our District. International Director Gary Brown from upstate New York was the special guest and featured speaker.

President-elect Glenda Summers presented the C.W.A. MacCormack Award to the Cameron Lions Club. The award is named in honor of one of the two delegates from the Lions Club of Austin to the October 1917 organizing convention of Lions Clubs International. It is awarded annually by the Austin Founder Lions Club to the most active club in the district based on Monthly Membership and Activity reports.

The club's delegates who voted in the District elections included Lions Greg Dew, Alan Ford, Mim Hruby, Patti Robinson, Glenda Summers, Siva Vankadaru, Ann Ward and Robert Watson. PDG J.P. Kirksey also voted as a member of the Honorary Committee.

Several club members also attended the MD-2 State Lions Convention in Waco, May 20-22. Those included PDG Shirley Dillman, an associate member; PDG J.P. Kirksey; PresidentElect Glenda Summers; Immediate Past President Ann Ward; and 1st Vice President-

Elect Past President Robert Watson. Kirksey coordinated a group to simulate marching in the parade for the virtual LCl Convention in June. The group was filmed, and the entry will be submitted to LCI.

AFLC purchased a full-page ad in the State Convention program. It recognizes club members in leadership roles at the club, District and state levels.

Ward, who is secretary of the Texas Lions Camp Board, was involved with the Lions Charities Banquet on May 21. This was followed by a parade of checks. In approximately 30 minutes, TLC received more than \$100,000 in donations and pledges!

On Saturday, May 22, attendees participated in one or more of four Global Causes service projects. Ward and Kirksey helped pack meals for Caritas of Waco, and Summers and Watson participated in packing books and other children's items for pediatric cancer patients at a local children's hospital.

# Texas Lions Camp Breaks Ground on New Construction, Launches New Approach to Summer Camp 

Lions made a big splash literally and figuratively on Feb. 6 during the Semi-Annual Texas Lions Camp Board meeting. Members of the camp board joined the Executive Committee for groundbreaking on Phase I of implementation of the new master plan. Following the meeting, attendees gathered on the site of the now demolished bunkhouse 2 for the groundbreaking ceremony.

At a special called board meeting in November 2020, the Phase 1 building plan was modified to accelerate the construction of the Eagle Trail area while erecting only two of the four Northern Quad larger bunkhouses. Eagle Trail will provide 12 self-contained 1 -room cabins, 2 -room cottages and 3-room small group homes. This modification will facilitate serving small pods of people, and post-pandemic, provide opportunities for housing medical and leadership staff during summer camp and for leasing to other groups, generating additional revenue for TLC. The capital campaign to raise money for Phase 1 was announced at the state convention in Waco, and naming opportunities are outlined on the camp's website at https:// www.lionscamp.com/donatecapital.html.

The board also authorized offering TLC-4-Families as a way to have children with special medical needs and their families on campus this summer. This new program uses camp facilities to strengthen the family unit and the relevancy of TLC as an organization to families with a special medical needs child. A remote camping experience also is available since family spots are limited. It is important to understand that TLC is unable to offer summer camp as we have known it under the current COVID environment.

TLC-4-Families, which kicked off June 8, offers a shorter-length camping experience for the entire family with a mix of structured activities and free time. In compliance with
social distancing requirements and the need to maintain "pods" of cohabiting people, family units are being housed separately in the 15 wings of the existing bunkhouses, which have been reconfigured to create a master bedroom and a living room. All meals are served in the dining hall.
"This is an exciting opportunity for TLC to serve families who likely need a break during this pandemic. Finding a way to safely house small family units and conduct small group activities makes it possible to continue to serve children with special medical needs this summer," according to Mabry. The June sessions are for families of a child with physical disabilities, and the July sessions are for families with a Type 1 diabetic child.

TLC Times, the remote program being offered this summer, is similar to the virtual camp offered in the summer of 2020. Children who register will receive up to three mailed editions of the TLC Times, a newspaper with a twist. Each issue is filled with activities and embedded QR Codes, which will link to resources, activities, stories and exciting content, all easily found by any internet-capable, camera-equipped device.

Although the Polar Bear Plunge at Mo Ranch on Jan. 1 was cancelled due to COVID concerns, several members of the TLC Polar Bear Court took the plunge in the camp pool around noon on Feb. 6, a blustery 58-degree day under sunny skies. The unique fund-raiser exceeded its goal of $\$ 250,000$, raising more than $\$ 310,000$ as of the pool event!

## Austin Founder Lions Continue to Enjoy Outstanding Programs

As the 2021 calendar year began, Austin Founder Lions continued to meet via Zoom. The Program Committee, chaired by Mac Ragsdale, kept club members coming back week-after-week with outstanding programs. The programs provided from January through April have ranged from reducing the gas produced by dairy cows and the importance of incarcerated mothers reading to their children to politics and services for the blind and visually impaired. The New Year kicked off on Jan. 7 with Austin American-Statesman columnist/armchair philosopher Ken Herman offering random musings on all things Austin, especially politics.


On Jan. 14, Jackie Nirenberg, community engagement manager for Capital Metro, informed the club about Project Connect, CapMetro's plan for a more connected, more equitable and more reliable public transportation system. The $\$ 7$ billion program includes three new rail lines, new MetroRapid routes, neighborhood circulators and new park and ride facilities to better serve Austin.


Club members met another of Membership Chair Mim Hruby's and Lion Ron Hruby's granddaughters on Jan. 21.
Alexis Hruby, a Ph.D. student
in dairy science at Virginia Tech, explained how nitrogen waste from animal agriculture can cause gas imbalances in nearby aquatic systems. She talked about ways to decrease nitrogen waste in dairy cattle through what they are fed.
 Jill Gonzalez, executive director of the Women's Storybook Project of Texas, spoke on Jan. 28 about how her organization works to connect children with their incarcerated mothers through the joy of literature. Her favorite picture book is Shh! We Have A Plan.


On Feb. 4, Sen. Sarah Eckhardt, who represents Austin, spoke about the issues facing Austin and Travis County during the 87th Texas Legislature. She explained that the Legislature is required to pass a two-year budget; other challenges included redistricting, health care, economic consequences of COVID-19 and the power grid failure, as well as the usual challenges of funding public education and health and human services for a growing population. In addition, Austin faced backlash related to reallocating Austin Police Department funds and camping of homeless people and their related issues.


Rusty Hruby, one of the Hrubys' sons, spoke on Feb. 11. He educated the club about private lending secured by real estate and how being a private lender can yield consistent, above-average returns. Since selling a software company he
founded, he shifted his focus to several real estate projects including self-storage, raw land, senior living, private lending and single-family residential.


Club members learned about Texas historical markers during the Feb. 25 meeting. Myra Hargrave Mcllvain is a teller of Texas tales through her books, lectures and blog. Mcllvain researched and wrote Texas historical markers, and became fascinated by the immigrant stories of Germans who settled in Texas, which spurred her to write 11 books about early settlement in Texas.


On March 4, members learned about VSP's Eyes of Hope programs. Gilbert Melgoza, charity care manager for the programs, discussed global initiatives that provide access to eye care, eyewear and disaster relief to places where it's needed most. To date, VSP Eyes of Hope has provided access to no-cost eye care and eyewear for more than 3.3 million people.


Life coach Sam Gozo provided a program on "Emotional Intelligence" on March 11. After working as a professional trainer, he formed his coaching practice in 2016 to help individuals find who they are and set goals from that place of self-awareness.


On March 18, Beth Slade, Leader Dog's director of philanthropy for Lions Engagement, talked about how "blindness changes everything." Although she thought the work would be "all about the dogs," her perspective changed after she met the people - the amazing clients, dedicated staff and volunteers whose stories and work she loves to share with others.


Dr. Jane Edmond, a member of the club and professor and chair of the Department of Ophthalmology at Dell Medical School, and director of the Mitchel and Shannon Wong Eye Institute, spoke March 25 on ocular health disparities affecting women. As people age, their eyes become more likely to develop conditions such as dry eye, age-related macular degeneration and glaucoma. While these conditions affect both genders, older women face enhanced risk.


In preparation for the May 1 local election, club members heard the pro's and con's of Prop F: Mayor-Council or Council-Manager at the April 1 program. Prop F asked voters whether they wanted to change the current governing model of a city council and city manager to one which would eliminate the position of city manager and designate an elected mayor as the chief administrative and executive officer of the city with veto power. Andrew Allison, from Austinites for Progressive Reform, spoke for the Mayor-Council approach. Jesus Garza, former Austin city manager and 2020 Austinite of the Year, provided the rationale for voting no and maintaining the current council-manager governing model. Ultimately voters rejected Prop F, voting to retain the current council-manager governance structure.


> On April 8, Michael Barnes, an Austin American-Statesman columnist and an author, talked about Austin, its people, culture and history. In specific, he talked about how the city has changed during the past several decades.


The annual Celebration of the A.I.S.D. Schools named after Austin Lions was held April 15. Alan Stevens, principal at


Boone Elementary, and Heather Parmelee, principal at Kocurek Elementary, described the impact of COVID-19 on standard operating procedures at their schools. Each principal shared successes, difficulties and responses to their educational challenges.


On April 22, A.I.S.D. District 2 School Board Member Ofelia Maldonado Zapata shared her experiences growing up with limited vision. Diagnosed as "clumsy" in the third-grade, the extent of her visual issues was not discovered until she sought a driver's license in her early 20s. She had trouble believing the doctor when he said she was going blind from Retinitis Pigmentosa, a rare, inherited degenerative eye disease. She hid her disability from everyone, even her family. She feared losing her husband, losing her job, losing everything. Now 60 and legally blind, Ofelia is a social justice warrior, with a long history of serving her community on multiple fronts. Though widowed at age 25, she raised her three daughters and later adopted a son. Today, she continues to work on social justice issues, especially housing, education, immigration, job training and legislative advocacy.


COVID has changed the world forever; new needs have been identified, and technology is changing how people do things. This is a good time to think about community service, and brainstorm about potential new service programs that may be more relevant to Austin in today's environment and to today's Austin Founder Lions. On April 29, the club participated in a brainstorming session led by Immediate Past President Ann Ward. Some 14 members responded to the request to submit ideas for new service projects or fund-raisers, as well as ways to enhance or update existing activities. Ward presented the 25 ideas anonymously, and meeting attendees
participated in several real-time Zoom polls to determine which merit further exploration. An idea for a new environmental project recycling plastic that the city does not accept was the top scoring new service idea.
